Commercial Tobacco Smoke Free Environment Proclamation Pueblo of Acoma

On **Tuesday**, **February 26**, **2019**, Pueblo of Acoma Governor Brian Vallo signed the Commercial Tobacco Smoke Free Environment Proclamation. This declaration will eliminate all commercial tobacco and electronic cigarette use in tribal building, community center, work place, enclosed public spaces, tribal vehicles, schools, days cares, recreational areas, tribal housing and outdoor tribal program events. The overall goal is targeted at protecting the health of community members from secondhand smoke, smokeless tobacco, commercial tobacco, and electronic cigarettes.

With the help and advocacy efforts from Acoma Behavioral Health Service Clinical Director, **Tonya Louis**, and **Acoma's Youth Coalition** they were able to bring awareness to this initiative. Governor Vallo commented "We hope that the proclamation will bring more light to the issue, that there will be greater acknowledgment by the Acoma community of this situation." He also commented about the significance of traditional tobacco within their culture.
