Monica Patten lives in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and her family is from Laguna Pueblo (Village Paguate). For the past eight years, she has worked as a Northeast Region Health Educator for the NM Department of Health's (DOH) Tobacco Use Prevention and Control Program (TUPAC). Monica has about 20 years' experience in tobacco control. Monica received her Master of Science degree in Health Education from the University of New Mexico.



Monica currently monitors some of the Native American-focused contracts for the TUPAC Program, has been a long-time member of the Southwest Tribal Tobacco Coalition, and supports other Native American efforts within DOH. Navajo Nation Chapters Take Steps to Protect the Community

Oso Vista Ranch Project is an eleven-year old non-profit corporation which commercial tobacco prevention outreach, education and secondhand smoke protection policy support to Diné communities. With Crownpoint Chapter leading the way, Oso Vista has helped 46 Chapter communities pass resolutions to protect non-smokers from secondhand smoke in public and work places.

In addition, Oso Vista has helped five Navajo Nation Chapters (Baahaali, Tohatchi, Mexican Springs, Red



Rock and Mariano Lake) pass resolutions to extend secondhand smoke protections to community homes. Supported by a grassroots education effort funded by the New Mexico Department of Health Tobacco Use Prevention and Control (TUPAC) program, these communities reviewed the mounting evidence that secondhand smoke is deadly and voted in favor of keeping community homes commercial tobacco smoke free.
